In The Interim



As your Ministerial Search Committee is all too aware, this search year has been tough on MSC's. There are a lot of congregations, and relatively few experienced ministers, in search. As May approaches, it is still not certain that UUCT will have a candidate.

Please understand that the absence of a candidate will not mean the search committee has failed. It will simply mean they have not found a candidate who fits with this church. I can assure you they are working very hard to find a good fit.

I'd like to explain the difference between a *call* and a *hire*. In our UU polity, when a congregation calls a minister, they enter into a covenant that is more like a marriage agreement than a corporate contract. As an interim minister, I was hired, not called.

The terms *call* and *covenant* are religious terms. For Unitarian Universalists, the covenant is between the minister and the congregation. For us, the power to call resides in the beloved community. It is the congregation, not God, that does the calling. (A minister will have his or her own sense of calling, which may be experienced as coming from God, but this is a slightly different meaning of the term *call*.)

Called ministers prefer the more covenantal term *letter of agreement* to the corporate term *contract*. While the agreement between congregation and minister is not "til death do us part," it nonetheless implies a commitment to stay in the relationship for the long haul. This covenant promises that, when differences arise—and they will, because we are human—both parties will stay in relationship and try to work them out.

While the minister's compensation package is generally reviewed annually, the agreement to be in relationship together is not time-limited. As your interim minister, on the other hand, I have a contract with a specific time limit. As of July 1, I am no longer your minister.

The Settlement Handbook recommends that the current minister stay away during Candidate Week. So, if a candidate is found, I will not be at the church from May 12-20. I will be working at home, and available for pastoral emergencies.

We interims are required by the UUA to sign an agreement not to return to the congregation after we leave. That means that I am enjoined from maintaining relations with any of you. As much as I might want to attend your worship services and other activities, I must stay away after June 30, unless your settled minister invites me to attend. The reason for this requirement is to create a space for you and your new minister to get acquainted without distractions.

Meanwhile, I am your minister for two more months, available for pastoral counseling, staff supervision, committee consultation, religious education, and worship. In these final months, I hope to be more a graceful snowbird than a lame duck! (-:

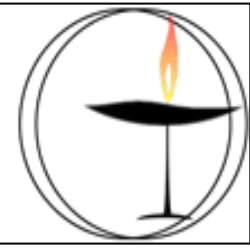

UUA Trustee Tidbits

This is the time of year congregations in search for a settled minister are in the process of candidating week and then calling their new minister. In most situations the minister has become a fellowshipped UU minister through The Ministerial Fellowship Committee (MFC). The MFC is responsible for all phases of ministerial credentialing. Candidates for ministerial fellowship are interviewed by the MFC before fellowship is granted. Additionally, the MFC has the authority to remove ministerial fellowship. Ministerial Fellowship is granted by the Association to those who meet and maintain the high standards and requirements for Unitarian Universalist Ministry. The MFC, appointed by the Board of Trustees, grants fellowship and governs the rules and policies which apply.

The MFC meets three times a year for 4 days and interviews candidates for a minimum of 2 full days, and occasionally an extra one-half day of interviews. On two of the days the MFC reviews reports, engages in anti-racism/anti-oppression/multiculturalism work, and conducts general business including guest speakers. The MFC has their own working groups which often meet over lunch, discussion candidacy, settlement, and process. Each packet from an aspiring minister is 100 pages in length and must be reviewed before interviewing the candidate. The MFC currently is in the process of reviewing its rules and policies.

Persons aspiring to UU Ministry first appear before the Regional MFC Sub-Committee on Candidacy (RSCC) who work with them and advise their further work. Information about preparation and the process of Ministerial Fellowship go through the Office of Ministerial Credentialing. The Ministerial Credentialing Director, Rev. David Petee, works with persons preparing for the UU ministry by communicating the requirements of the MFC relating to theological schools, administering scholarship aid, and supporting opportunities for field education, internships, workshops, and other programs.

If a disciplinary review of a minister is necessary it is handled by the MFC. Ethical or conduct complaints which are not resolved directly within a congregation or with the assistance of the

District Executive (DE) may be addressed to the MFC through Rev. Tracey Robinson-Harris, Director of Congregational Services, who advises complainants of appropriate steps and resources available to them. The MFC is charged with significant ethical or conduct concerns that could lead to disciplinary action. But in many instances complaints can be resolved directly with a minister, within congregational structures, or with the assistance from the DE.

There is some general confusion on the procedure for scheduling an event at the church, so for anyone new here is the procedure. For anyone who has been around for a while, it's a good refresher.

1. Check the calendar to see if an event is already scheduled for the day you would like to request. This can be done by looking at the calendar when the office is open, or by calling the church office and asking if the date is available.
2. Complete a *calendar request form* located in the pockets below the calendars in the office. Place the completed one in the pocket opposite the blank forms.
3. The office administrator will write the information on the calendar once it is approved by the minister and/or Board of Trustees (whichever is appropriate for that event). **DO NOT WRITE ON THE CALENDAR IN THE OFFICE!!**
4. Check the calendar or call the office to make sure your event was approved.

Please note that you can determine where your event is scheduled by using the following color code: **RED** ink is for the large dome, **BLUE** is for the small dome, and **BLACK** is for any other meeting place (i.e. office, nursery, etc.). It is very important to follow this procedure to avoid double-bookings and other conflicts. Please be aware that no particular date or night is "reserved" for any group or committee at the church. Church space is a first-come-first-serve basis, so get your requests in early. The next book for the **Book Discussion** Group will be John Sims Jeter's new book, . . . *and the angels sang*. John is a former member of UUCT who recently moved from Temple Terrace, Florida to Huntsville, Alabama. His short story, *The Man Who Took Notes*, was published in the 2004-2005 Issue of *The Louisville Review* and nominated for 2005 Pushcart Prize XXIX. Another short story, *My Life as a Lid*, appears in the 2006-2007 issue of *Palm Prints*, a literary journal of Lifelong Writers – University of South Florida.



Synopsis: . . . *and the angels sang* is a novel about a Southern boy who grew up loving baseball and classical music, as well as poetry, and the beauty of natural surroundings. In the course of his life, engineer Jon Bernier falls in love with three different women, who embody in their own lives a love of music, poetry, and nature. The novel contains an exciting mystery story, as well as wonderful descriptions of Alabama and the Berkshires, of country life and of the concert hall.

The story is told in an intimate, sensitive, honest voice--one with authentic masculine tenderness. The scenes and characters in the book spring to life, and readers will feel that their own lives have been enriched by knowing these characters and their experiences.

John will be giving a reading and book signing at 7:00PM on Thursday, May 10th at Inkwood Books - 216 S. Armenia Avenue (corner of Pratt and Armenia--just south of Kennedy Blvd.). He would love to see as many UUCT'ers, and their friends, at Inkwood as possible.

Board of Trustees Nominations

The Board Nominating Committee this year was Liz Bleau, Martha Robinson, and Tom Hagner. There are three seats where the current Board member's term is expiring: Ed Benedict, Bill Blymiller, and Tom Hagner. Fortunately for UUCT, Ed and Bill have agreed to stand for re-election; however, Tom is reaching the end of his second elected three years term and must step down per the By-laws. Again, fortunately for UUCT, Mary Francis has accepted nomination to the Board. The election will occur May 6th at the congregational meeting in accordance with the By-laws. The Bios for the three candidates follow.

Ed Benedict: Ed grew up in north-central Texas where he attended Catholic grammar school, public high school, and college. Upon graduation from college in 1963, he entered the United States Air Force as a career officer, where he served for 21 years in the intelligence field. Following retirement from the USAF, he taught for 16 years in the public schools in Tampa, Florida as a social studies teacher. Ed's religious affiliations include converting to Catholicism at age 18. By 1966, he was slowly moving towards Unitarianism. He joined his first Unitarian Universalist church in 1969 in Arlington, Virginia. He was active in the Ramstein, Germany UU Fellowship between 1975 and 1980. He and his wife, Pat, joined the Tampa church in 1997. While a member of the Tampa church, Ed has served on the Membership committee, the Comprehensive Planning Committee, and as a Middle School Religious Education teacher for four years. He has been a member of the Board of Trustees since 2001. Ed is our long standing (and much appreciated) Treasurer.

Bill Blymiller: Bill is a newcomer to Unitarian Universalism and advises that he will always remain so. Bill has been with the UUCT since late 2002. He has served the church in various capacities including sound-man, yard mower, committee member, and has been on the Board of Trustees for the past three years. On the Board, he has served as Secretary and is currently Vice President. He attends church with his wife Harriet. He is a

co-founder and remains active in the Humanist discussion group (SHAAG/SHAAFT) and participates in as many church activities as he can. Bill advises that he "is a troublesome Board member who is often in error and seldom in doubt. My parole officer reports that my 'playing with others' skills have increased during this time at the Tampa church. I am currently Vice President and only a heartbeat away from really causing trouble." In fact, Bill is one of our most dedicated and hard-working members and a wonderful teacher besides.
